Lesson 1: God's Vision, Our City







Coke's vision is "refresh the world", Disney's "make people happy".

What's your company's vision?

Vision is a vital aspect of any endeavour. A clear vision helps us

discriminate between the good and the essential.



God's vision is to bring every part of creation together under Jesus' rule.



While you read – What is God's vision for all creation?

He made known to us the mystery of his will according to his good pleasure, which he purposed in Christ, ¹⁰ to be put into effect when the times reach their fulfillment—to bring unity to all things in heaven and on earth under Christ.

Ephesians 1:9-10

A Firm Foundation God's Vision, Our City

Key Truths

1. Everything in all of creation, throughout all of history, has a single, stunning focus in God's

mind – that everything, everywhere is under Jesus' rule.

- 2.God's plan from 'before the creation of the world' (v4) is revealed to us in Jesus.
- 3. The centre of God's vision is Jesus' rule, there is nothing more important.

Application

There are so many things we can devote our lives to: improving the lives of others, building better systems, releasing capital for vital projects, loving and caring for family or the unloved. And these are all good things. But vision is about discriminating between good and essential. In God's plan, there's only one focus – Jesus is Lord of all. Our lives need to align with God's vision. What is God's vision for our city? If Jesus is to be the Lord in your workplace, those who aren't followers of Jesus need to follow him. They need to meet him and submit to his rule. Who will you invite to meet Jesus this year?

Share together about the people you want to pray for this year.

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Lesson 2: Prayer - The Best Thing we can do?





In a hectic world, activism is the only answer – If you want to get anything done, you have to get in and get it done.

How does this resonate with you?

How does this impact our thinking about people coming to Jesus?



God calls us to share the good news of Jesus with those around us, but God is the great evangelist who calls people to himself. Therefore, prayer is the best thing we can do!



While you read – How do people come to Jesus?

And this is the will of him who sent me, that I shall lose none of all those he has given me, but raise them up at the last day.⁴⁰ For my Father's will is that everyone who looks to the Son and believes in him shall have eternal life, and I will raise them up at the last day."

⁴¹ At this the Jews there began to grumble about him because he said, "I am the bread that came down from heaven." ⁴² They said, "Is this not Jesus, the son of Joseph, whose father and mother we know? How can he now say, 'I came down from heaven'?"

⁴³ "Stop grumbling among yourselves," Jesus answered. ⁴⁴ "No one can come to me unless the Father who sent me draws them, and I will raise them up at the last day. ⁴⁵ It is written in the Prophets: 'They will all be taught by God.' Everyone who has heard the Father and learned from him comes to me. John 6:39-45



Key Truths

- 1. No one comes to Jesus unless God draws them. People come to Jesus as they hear from the Father and learn from him. (v44-45)
- 2. A close relationship with a Christian is a good start for sharing Jesus, but it doesn't
- guarantee someone will accept him as their Lord. The grumbling Jews knew Jesus
- and his family personally and they still didn't come to Jesus.
- 3. It is God who calls us, it is God who saves us, and it is God who saves our friends not us.
- 4. No one is outside of God's ability to save, and everyone is someone we could potentially invite to meet Jesus in the pages of the Bible.

While you read – What does it look like to inherit eternal life?

"The God who made the world and everything in it is the Lord of heaven and earth and does not live in temples built by human hands.²⁵And he is not served by human hands, as if he needed anything. Rather, he himself gives everyone life and breath and everything else. Acts 17:24-25

Each of you should give what you have decided in your heart to give, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver.



Key Truths

- 1. God made everything and gives to everyone impartially.
- 2.God isn't short of cash he doesn't need our service, or our giving.
- 3. God gives life, breath, and everything. There's nothing we can give to God that he
 - doesn't already own.
- 4. When we give to the growth of the kingdom, we're not doing God a favour. It's a
 - chance to joyfully worship.

Under Pressure

Lesson 1: Faultless







Whether it's "Wear it purple" day, rainbow lanyards, or other measures in the name of diversity – there is increasing pressure on Christians to assent to secular values in the workplace.

Where have you faced pressure to speak or act against your conscience?



When it comes to facing pressure to act or speak contrary to your Christian conscience in the workplace, it pays to have a faultless reputation.





No Character in the Bible understands our predicament more than Daniel who was one of the top administrators under the pagan king, Darius. Daniel was so exceptional, Darius planned to make him the prime minister of Persia. The others in the public service, in their jealousy, sought to find dirt – but finding no corruption due to his faithfulness, so targeted his religion.

They set up a rule to ban praying to anyone but the king, and then sprung Daniel praying in his room, and dobbed him into the king.



라Bible Passage

While you read – What is Darius' demeanour towards Daniel? Why?

Then they said to the king, "Daniel, who is one of the exiles from Judah, pays no attention to you, Your Majesty, or to the decree you put in writing. He still prays three times a day." ¹⁴ When the king heard this, he was greatly distressed; he was determined to rescue Daniel and made every effort until sundown to save him.

¹⁵Then the men went as a group to King Darius and said to him, "Remember, Your Majesty, that according to the law of the Medes and Persians no decree or edict that the king issues can be changed."

¹⁶ So the king gave the order, and they brought Daniel and threw him into the lions' den. The king said to Daniel, "May your God, whom you serve continually, rescue you!" ¹⁷ A stone was brought and placed over the mouth of the den, and the king sealed it with his own signet ring and with the rings of his nobles, so that Daniel's situation might not be changed. ¹⁸ Then the king returned to his palace and spent the night without eating and without any entertainment being brought to him. And he could not sleep.

¹⁹At the first light of dawn, the king got up and hurried to the lions' den. ²⁰ When he came near the den, he called to Daniel in an anguished voice, "Daniel, servant of the living God, has your God, whom you serve continually, been able to rescue you from the lions?"

²¹ Daniel answered, "May the king live forever! ²² My God sent his angel, and he shut the mouths of the lions. They have not hurt me, because I was found innocent in his sight. Nor have I ever done any wrong before you, Your Majesty."

Daniel 6:13-22



1. Darius knows Daniel disobeyed him, but far from being angry, he's greatly distressed. He

tries everything to release him, but in the end he can only hope that Daniel's God will deliver him.

- 2. Darius is distraught because he knew Daniel was faithful and blameless and has been caught in a legal loophole.
- 3. In the end, it didn't matter if Darius threw Daniel to the lions with guilt and anguish, or glee and anger – God decided if Daniel was to suffer at Darius' hand or not.





Key Truths (cont.)

- 3. Likewise, it doesn't matter if your boss, or if HR, like you or not only God's opinion of you matters. Nothing can separate us from the love of God expressed in Christ. If God is for you, who can stand against you?
- 4. While we are sinners saved by grace and will never be perfect, we can still strive for a
- faultless reputation in the workplace.

Application

What do we do when our workplace culture is at odds with our Christian beliefs?

There are 3 options: We can either run away, pretend we're on board, or give an answer

that lessens our colleagues' opinion of us.

Whatever our choice, if people are going to despise us, let it be despite what they see in

the rest of our life.

Wear it purple day is 27 August. What relational capital can you build before then?



Remember

Pray for open eyes to see where you can be loving our colleagues and building relational capital.

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Pray that we would trust in our forgiveness in Jesus and seek to see our blamelessness before God as more important than what others think of us.

Pray for that next step for our colleagues also finding forgiveness in Jesus.









Under Pressure

Lesson 2: Faithful







Think of the last time you've been put on the spot. The adrenaline, the fear, the panic. How did you respond?



You don't suddenly become faithful overnight. The way we respond to a moment of crisis is a reflex of our everyday faithfulness.



While you read – Despite the harsh decree from Darius, why does Daniel pray?

Now when Daniel learned that the decree had been published, he went home to his upstairs room where the windows opened toward Jerusalem. Three times a day he got down on his knees and prayed, giving thanks to his God, just as he had done before.

Daniel 6:10



Key Truths

- 1. Daniel's response to the unfair, targeted edict could have been to run and hide, or outwardly comply but inwardly remain faithful, or defy the edict. Daniel does what "he had done before." He prays three times a day, giving thanks to God.
- 2. Daniel responds in faithfulness because it was what he had always done. There was
- "no corruption in him, because he was trustworthy" (Daniel 6:4) It is much easier to respond in faithfulness if you have been exercising faithfulness consistently.
- 3. We can often think of prayer as a last resort. But for Daniel, it's his first! We can quickly
- forget that we have access to the king of the universe always! When a moment of crisis hits, the faithful get praying.

Application

Too busy! We often tell ourselves we're too busy getting things done to pray. We respond to the (relatively light) pressures of deadlines and responsibilities by getting busier. How do you think we will respond to a moment of crisis? We need to build a habit of faithfulness. By God's grace, he doesn't leave us to do that on our own. We have the gift of other Christians to help each other, build each other up. This EPT is a place to build spiritual resilience to moments of crisis, and to build a kingdom focus so when the moment of crisis comes we can respond with God's kingdom in mind. We make time for that which we decide is important. Will you be too busy for prayer this year?

How would you respond to a moment of crisis that would make you proud?



Pray for faithfulness to God at all times Pray for the determination to prioritise prayer this year. Pray for that next step for our colleagues meeting Jesus.

Lesson 3: Fearless







"Can I just speak with you for a minute?"

On the lips of a manager, or an HR rep, potentially the most terrifying words you could hear in the workplace.

Are there people or circumstances that you fear in your workplace?



Being fearless in the workplace is not about having no fear – but having our fear in the right place



While you read – What does it mean to fear God?

At the first light of dawn, the king got up and hurried to the lions' den. ²⁰ When he came near the den, he called to Daniel in an anguished voice, "Daniel, servant of the living God, has your God, whom you serve continually, been able to rescue you from the lions?"

²¹ Daniel answered, "May the king live forever! ²² My God sent his angel, and he shut the mouths of the lions. They have not hurt me, because I was found innocent in his sight. Nor have I ever done any wrong before you, Your Majesty."

²³The king was overjoyed and gave orders to lift Daniel out of the den. And when Daniel was lifted from the den, no wound was found on him, because he had trusted in his God.



子 Bible Passage (cont.)

[...]

²⁵ Then King Darius wrote to all the nations and peoples of every language in all the earth: "May you prosper greatly! ²⁶ "I issue a decree that in every part of my kingdom people must fear and reverence the God of Daniel.

"For he is the living God

and he endures forever;

his kingdom will not be destroyed,

his dominion will never end.

²⁷ *He rescues and he saves;*

he performs signs and wonders in the heavens and on the earth. He has rescued Daniel from the power of the lions."

Daniel 6:19-23, 25-27



1. The might of Darius was the mouths of a den of lions, but he rightly recognises the

might of the living God who saved Daniel.

2. Daniel is bold to declare his innocence to King Darius, and indeed to keep praying to

God in the first place.

3. Darius is captured by Daniel's faithfulness, faultlessness, and fearlessness – as well as God's faithful rescuing of Daniel from his hand. He calls upon all people in the world, in

every language, to also fear Daniel's God.

4. Darius becomes the world's most unlikeliest evangelist for the God of Daniel!

Thoughts? Questions?







Our jobs, like all good things, come from the hand of our loving heavenly Father. And yet, we can drift into thinking our success or failure rests on the knife-edge of our performance, or our superior's opinion of us. If that's the case, we will forever live in fear that it could disappear in a moment. Or else we're tempted to compromise our beliefs to fit in or at least avoid being thrown to the cultural lions. But a right view of God helps us see that God is in control and our would-be enemies are

people made in his image like us; they are our equals before God. Daniel wasn't scared of God, but he esteemed God's opinions more than Darius'.

How might getting a right view of God help us in our workplaces? Who are the people in your life you need to fear less than God?



Remember

Pray that your colleagues would likewise see the wisdom in fearing our God.



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Pray for boldness in following God before others - no matter what may happen.

Lesson 4: Right Place, Right Time







"Life is what happens to you when you're busy making other plans." John Lennon. So often our attention is drawn to the next thing, our future; or else we dwell on the past. It can be difficult to notice what is happening right now.

How often do you pause to reflect on why you're in the role you're currently in?



God has put us in the exact time and place we're in so that people might find him through us.



While you read – Why has God put Christians in the place and time they are in?

"The God who made the world and everything in it is the Lord of heaven and earth and does not live in temples built by human hands.²⁵ And he is not served by human hands, as if he needed anything. Rather, he himself gives everyone life and breath and everything else.²⁶ From one man he made all the nations, that they should inhabit the whole earth; and he marked out their appointed times in history and the boundaries of their lands.²⁷ God did this so that they would seek him and perhaps reach out for him and find him, though he is not far from any one of us.²⁸ 'For in him we live and move and have our being.' As some of your own poets have said, 'We are his offspring.'

Acts 17:24-28

Right Place, Right Time

Key Truths

- 1. God doesn't fit into our little temples, nor does he squeeze into our little plans. We fit within his grand schemes for all of history.
- 2. God has set out our exact times and places so that we might seek him, reach out and find him (though he's not far from any of us). This must also include when and where we work.
- 3. If God has set the places and times unbelievers work so they might find him, it follows that he has also set the times and places Christians work so that through us people might find him.
- 4. It is no accident that we are working with the people we are, it is part of God's plan to

see unbelievers come to know Jesus.

Do you remember praying before you got your current role? Do you remember why you applied and agreed to take the role? Was sharing Jesus part of what you were thinking about?

As we've seen, it's clear that sharing Jesus was part of God's purpose. How does this change how you view your colleagues? When was the last time you considered the eternal destiny of those around you at work? How does it change your prayers?

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Lesson 5: Better Together







If you were going to build an international movement, how would you do it?

Recruit a world-famous rapper?

Find an exceptional evangelistic speaker to tour the globe?

Launch a viral advertising campaign?



As we seek to build God's kingdom, we need to understand that we work better together.



Two are better than one,

because they have a good return for their labour:

¹⁰ If either of them falls down,

one can help the other up.

But pity anyone who falls

and has no one to help them up.

¹¹ Also, if two lie down together, they will keep warm.

But how can one keep warm alone?

¹² Though one may be overpowered,

two can defend themselves.

A cord of three strands is not quickly broken.

Ecclesiastes 4:9-12



Key Truths

Have you noticed how God chooses to build his kingdom? God doesn't use exceptional people but small groups of ordinary people.

- Brothers and sisters, think of what you were when you were called. Not many of you were wise by human standards; not many were influential; not many were of noble birth.
- Consider this. Jesus gathered twelve unlikely and unknown people to kick off God's kingdom (even more amazing when you consider the infighting, gaffs, and betrayal recorded in the Gospels). When Jesus sent out the 72 followers he sent them out two by

two (Luke 10:1). Finally, when Jesus commissioned his disciples before he ascended, he commands them all (plural) to make disciples. Jesus has a pattern of calling teams of people to his mission.

But what of that great evangelist, Paul? Surely he's an exceptional person? He is, but he never operates alone – he's always a part of a team. Barnabas, Timothy, Titus, Priscilla & Aquilla, Epaphras, Luke, Demas (Romans 16:3-21, 1 Thessalonians 3:2, Philemon 22-25, Colossians 4:7,10-17, 2 Corinthians 8:23).

God rescues individuals to be a people for his own possession, a holy nation (1 Peter 2:9) – we become part of a team. We need to understand – we're better together. Even from the start, in Genesis 2:18, God states, "It is not good for the man to be alone." We're better together, "As iron sharpens iron, so one person sharpens another." (Proverbs 27:17) and as the author of Ecclesiastes states in our passage above, "two are better than one" and, "a cord of three strands is not quickly broken." Many use this passage to speak about marriage, but it's actually talking about having a brother or son as a business partner.

Being on our own is hard; we're better together.

When it comes to sharing Jesus with our friends and colleagues, we were never meant to go it alone. Evangelism works better when we're a part of a team. We can sharpen one another, we help each other, support one another, encourage one another, and keep each other accountable.

Evangelistic Prayer Teams seek to help Christian workers to share Jesus with their friends and colleagues. They help us focus on evangelism, we depend on God in prayer, and they also get us working together towards seeing people meet Jesus in the pages of the Bible.

How could you work together as a team to help each other share Jesus with your friends and colleagues?

(Maybe spend some time brainstorming how you can support one another in sharing Jesus)

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Lesson 6: Why we Don't







Think back to a moment where you had an opportunity to share Jesus with a colleague and you let it slip. What kept you from sharing in that moment?



Evangelism is the expression of love for God and love for others that Jesus calls every Christian to.



While you read – What does it look like to be someone who is inheriting eternal life?

On one occasion an expert in the law stood up to test Jesus. "Teacher," he asked, "what must I do to inherit eternal life?"

²⁶ "What is written in the Law?" he replied. "How do you read it?"

²⁷ He answered, "'Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength and with all your mind'; and, 'Love your neighbour as yourself.'"
 ²⁸ "You have answered correctly," Jesus replied. "Do this and you will live."

Luke 10:25-28



Key Truths

- 1. Above all else, Christians are called to love God with everything and love our neighbour as our self.
- 2. Jesus deserves our absolute devotion. He is the very God, who in love willingly gave his life for us. If we are captured by Jesus' glory, we can't help wanting the world to sing his praises – we will want everyone to join us in our devotion to Jesus.
- 3. Our love for others means we love them enough to want them to share in our certain
 - future in Jesus, and avoid the terrible, fixed, and final reality of hell. Do we love our
 - colleagues enough to speak up even when it is hard?
- Thoughts? Questions?

S Application

In a culture increasingly hostile to Jesus, if you're going to share Jesus with someone who doesn't know him, you're going to get 'hit'. It's more likely the 'hit' will be a negative comment or at worst a loss of relationship rather than a physical 'hit', but if we are to share Jesus there is a painline that needs to be crossed. We all want to stay on the comfortable side of the painline, because we're wired to avoid pain. It means something has gone wrong – so we stop, or we change what we say. But nothing has gone wrong, we're following the crucified one – the world hates Jesus (John 7:7, 15:18) and it will hate his followers. While we live in fear of getting 'hit' we'll never share Jesus. Does this sound familiar?

So why would we ever risk getting hit? Because we might find hunger! God is calling the lost to himself – God is working to build his kingdom!

But even knowing this we can still shy away from sharing Jesus – because our hearts are disordered. An idol is anything we love more than Jesus and our hearts are idol factories. We are built to worship, but the tragedy is we worship anything other than Jesus. Often when we baulk at crossing the painline in sharing Jesus, it's because we have replaced our love of Jesus with something else – wanting to be liked or to remain comfortable perhaps. We need to recognise when our hearts have gone astray and renew our love for God and our neighbour.





Application (cont.)

Rico Tice says

'I've come to see that I can have all the understanding I need, I can have a great way of explaining the gospel, I can talk the talk with other Christians, I can read (or even write) books about Evangelism...but unless I have identified and am uprooting the idols of my heart, I still won't actually get across that painline and tell people about Jesus. And neither will you.' Honest Evangelism

Lesson 7: Conquer Fear, Find Yearning, Ignite Passion







Christians love Jesus, they love people, they desire to see Jesus honoured by all, they love to hear of people becoming Christians. In other words, we love evangelism. Yet many Christians find evangelism too hard – why is that?

This is a study based upon material from Rico Tice's *Honest Evangelism*



Few people have actually read the Bible for themselves. Offering to read the Bible together allows the gospel to speak for itself with you there as a guide.



While you read – What is the power of Paul's message?

For I resolved to know nothing while I was with you except Jesus Christ and him crucified. ³ I came to you in weakness with great fear and trembling. ⁴ My message and my preaching were not with wise and persuasive words, but with a demonstration of the Spirit's power, ⁵ so that your faith might not rest on human wisdom, but on God's power. 1Corinthians 2:2-5

Conquer Fear, Find Yearning, Ignite Passion

Key Truths

1. Fear of crossing painlines

We live in a culture that is apathetic, and even increasingly hostile towards Jesus. No matter how charming, smart, or funny you are, it doesn't matter how right your answers are... you are going to be hit if you share Jesus. The hit might be a snide comment, relationships ending, it might be your reputation, your career, or even being hit.

"We're wired to assume that if we're getting hit, something's gone wrong. And so whenever I tell someone the gospel message, and get hit (metaphorically speaking), there's a temptation either to stop saying anything, or to change what I'm saying. I know there is a painline that needs to be crossed if I tell someone the gospel; but I

want to stay on the comfortable side of the painline. Of course I do!'

To what extent does this resonate with you?

2. Following Jesus – the crucified one

Shockingly, Jesus prepared his disciples for this – things haven't gone wrong, it is just the new normal. Jesus said, "I am sending you out like sheep among wolves." (Matthew 10:16). Wolves bite sheep. Wolves devour sheep. The world hates us because it hates God. Jesus said, "If the world hates you, keep in mind that it hated me first." (John 15:18). This is why it is so hard to talk about Jesus – the crucified one.

"...I bet that if you have stopped trying [to share Jesus] it's because you've come to one of two conclusions. Either you don't think it's working, because you got hit; or you don't think it's worth it, because you got hit' Rico Tice, Honest Evangelism

If we are going to start (or restart) sharing the great news of Jesus with our colleagues, we're going to have to be willing to cross the painline. Unless we're willing to cross that painline and risk getting hit, we won't share Jesus.

3. Hit or Hunger?

While our culture is increasingly hostile, there is also growing spiritual hunger. The endless pursuits of materialism and hedonismare empty and dissatisfying – and people are starting to realise. God is calling the lost to himself, and he calls through his people as they declare the great news of Jesus and him crucified. This is what Paul did – he opened his mouth and spoke, and God worked by his Spirit. Paul crossed the painline and so a church was born.

'Until you cross the painline, you don't know what response you will meet with. Sometimes you will get hit, just as Paul did. Sometimes you find hunger, just as Paul

did' Rico Tice, Honest Evangelism

4. Why we share Jesus

So when we cross the painline to share Jesus, we will either get hit, or find hunger. So why would we take the risk? Rico Tice gives three reasons:

- 1. Jesus glory Jesus deserves the world's adoration. He is the very God who died to
- free us from sin and rose again to rule over all. If we're not captured by the wonder of
- who Jesus is, sharing Jesus will not be a priority for us.
- 2. The new creation Jesus has defeated death and will bring about the new heavens and earth. If we're not excited by our future in Jesus, we're not going to cross the painline.
- 3. The grim reality of hell Our future is assured in Jesus, but our colleagues' future depends on how they respond to Jesus. Recall Jesus' warning to cut off a hand or a

foot or pluck out an eye rather than be thrown into hell – Hell is real, fixed, and final.

Why we don't 5.

Often when we don't cross the painline it's a heart problem. When we love something more than we love God – that's an idol. When we don't share Jesus, it could be that we've substituted our love of God for an idol – our desire to be liked, our hope to avoid an awkward situation, keeping our job...

We need to rekindle our love for the Lord Jesus, to recognise how wide and long and deep is the love of Christ. There's no secret formula – we need to keep reading our Bible and praying so we can know Jesus better.
