The gospel, or good news, of Jesus is, well, good news - but why?

The gospel is a many faceted jewel. It reveals God's character, displays his power, and creates a universal people united in Christ. However, at it's heart the gospel is a message of reconciliation of a rebellious people to their creator and king - God.

Key Truths

GOD IS WORTHY OF OUR WORSHIP

- 1. God is the creator of all including us. As his creatures, we were made with a purpose
- and therefore we have meaning. We are not by-products of a mindless, cosmic
- accident. What we do matters.
- 2. As our creator, God is our rightful ruler, deserving of our worship, glory, honour, and obedience.

GOD WANTS GOOD FOR US AND HIS CREATION

- 1. God lovingly cares for and sustains his creation.
- 2. Humanity holds a special place in God's affections, we are meant to curate the world

under God's loving rule. This is how things should be.

3. The flourishing of creation under humanity is part of God's plan for creation.

ORIGIN OF EVIL

- 1. Despite our privileged position, we reject God, refusing to worship him, or obey him. We
- instead seek to live however we see fit millions of tiny dictators in a hostile world set
- off-kilter.
- 2. Our rejection of God breaks our relationship with him, each other, and creation. All of
- life's pain and suffering stems from our rejection of our creator and our worship of unworthy things in creation.

GOD ESTABLISHES JUSTICE

- 1. God is the true Lord of all creation and can not ignore our affront to his rule and justice.
- 2. God will re-establish his justice with his creation he will vindicate the just and punish
- the guilty. We yearn for justice, we hate it when the guilty go free and the innocent are trampled underfoot.
- 3. But, we're all guilty and so can only wait in expectation that the judge of all the earth will prosecute his case eternal death.
- 4.A weak jumped up rebel hasn't a hope to stand before the righteous, all-powerful judge of all.

In which circumstances have you heard people say they want to see justice done?


When you consider the holiness of God, and the affront to him our rejection represents, do you think God's judgment is fair?

GOD'S SOLUTION

1. God could just let us off the hook, but that's a miscarriage of justice – God can have

nothing to do with such corruption. There's nothing for it, we face God's anger.

2. Except God. God is love and out of his love he sent his Son, Jesus Christ into the world. Unlike us, he always lived as the perfect human under God's rule – he is truly innocent

- before God. Jesus did not deserve death.
- 3. However, Jesus did die. He willingly gave his life, stepping into our place, dying as our representative and substitute.
- 4. Jesus is no tragic hero. God doesn't just make the most of a bad situation. It was always
 - God's plan to redeem a rebellious people to himself.
- 5. Jesus was raised to new life as the rightful ruler of the world the position humanity was always meant to hold the ruler of creation under God.
- 6. Jesus' resurrection shows that death as a punishment is over, it has been met for all who are in Christ, raised with him in new life. Now we can live as we were meant to – with God as our ruler.
- 7. Jesus is the ruler and will return to judge all who remain opposed to him.

THE LOGIC OF THE GOOD NEWS OF JESUS 4: JESUS IS LORD & OUR RESPONSE





The good news of Jesus makes sense. It's internally coherent and makes good sense of the world around us – the problem of evil, our desire for justice, our relationships with the world, with each other, and with God. But the good news of Jesus is not an abstract series of facts – it demands a response.



The good news of Jesus demands a response; to either continue to reject God and remain under condemnation, or to submit to Jesus' rule and be forgiven and have eternal life in him.





While you read – Why is God worthy of our worship?

God exalted him to the highest place

and gave him the name that is above every name,

¹⁰ that at the name of Jesus every knee should bow,

in heaven and on earth and under the earth,

¹¹ and every tongue acknowledge that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father.

Philippians 2:9-11

Whoever believes in the Son has eternal life, but whoever rejects the Son will not see life, for God's wrath remains on them.

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JESUS IS LORD

- 1. God has raised Jesus to the highest place the judge of all the world.
- 2. God's proof that he has appointed Jesus to be our judge is his resurrection.

OUR RESPONSE

- 1. We can either continue rejecting God, waltzing on our merry way to destruction or we can live God's way, trusting in Jesus' death and living our new resurrection life in
 - him.
- 2. Our choice is repentance and faith, or continued rejection and condemnation.
- 3. As we share the great news of Jesus, we need to encourage our hearers to see how

they are currently living opposed to God, and that they need to decide to either be reconciled to God through Jesus or remain under God's judgment.
