

Courage in Community

When it comes to sharing the gospel, Geoff and Eunice know they are not alone. Geoff said, "We're really glad we don't do mission alone. We do it in a gospel community... We can be on mission together and know that we've got each other's backs. Sometimes it's difficult, and sometimes you don't really know where conversations are going, or sometimes they're uncomfortable, but you just feel courageous knowing that there are other brothers and sisters in Christ who are also spreading the gospel."

We asked Eunice how she came to start reading the Bible with husband Geoff's work colleague Anita*. Eunice had attended a Word One-to-One training session and felt challenged to read with someone. She said, "I was praying and asking God to provide someone I could read this with, and this colleague of Geoff's came to mind."

Geoff explained that he'd been open about his faith with Anita at work, dropping 'appetisers' of what it is like to read the Bible. He got to a point where he felt prompted by God to draw upon those earlier interactions and have the courage to say to Anita, "Eunice is looking to read the Bible with someone and we had you in mind". To his delight, she said yes!

Eunice and Anita have met six times working their way through the gospel of John. The Bible isn't at all what Anita expected. She expected it to be a book of rules but instead found it to be the story of a person. She is starting to understand who Jesus is.

Eunice said, "It's so encouraging for me to see the Bible approached from fresh eyes... by the second episode... (Anita) said to me, 'I wonder how it would have felt for Jesus to come to this world just to die', and

it was amazing to see her engage not just intellectually and logically, but emotionally with Jesus coming to this world."

Eunice said, "For me it's been really encouraging to know that I don't need to have the perfect explanations or answers to her questions. It's God's word that speaks. I've felt tempted to be scared of the kinds of questions she might ask but it isn't about my confidence."

Their prayer for Anita is that she won't just read and know about God but actually believe what Jesus says. They have welcomed her into their church community and hope that she can be surrounded by Christians so it isn't just them sharing the gospel, but the church community who can help bring her to Christ.

Geoff shared his hope that there would be many other workplace evangelism stories like theirs. He said, "Helping workers to see their workplace as a missionfield is so important because we do spend most of our time at work whether we like it or not. Training workers how to evangelise, to be praying, to be on mission is just such great work."

Strategy Update

City Bible Forum does many things: nine professional or demographic affinity groups (e.g. graduates, women, lawyers), events and conferences, evangelistic missions and mentoring, podcasts and more. From our humble beginnings 32 years ago, our aim has always been for workers to hear the gospel through the natural connections formed through daily work.

Many find living for and speaking about Jesus at work difficult. There is unrelenting busyness coupled with fear (perceived and real) of identifying with the way of Jesus. Yet we have the privilege of seeing people patiently serving their colleagues and respectfully having deeper conversations. Sometimes these conversations lead to reading the Bible. Sometimes these conversations lead people to a saving faith in Christ Jesus.

Six months ago, we committed to focusing more intentionally on growing the number of people involved in evangelistic Bible reading. We started the year with 170 people. Since then, 77 new people have started (and some have stopped) this journey, and we currently have 221 enquirers investigating Jesus in the Bible. Our prayer is that this number will grow to 1,000 at any given moment. Even more, we trust that many of these people will be saved as God's Spirit uses His word to bring repentance and faith.

We are delighted to share this winter update with you and we deeply appreciate your prayers and financial support for this part of God's mission, to reconcile the world to Himself through the workplaces of Australia.

The icing on the cake for us was being in the position to offer both women positions to continue the great work they had started. We praise God for how He has worked! From meeting Madelaine and Natalie as young workers to honing their skills as trainees to them now joining as permanent members of our team has been wonderful.

And because our God is so generous, there is not just cake but an extra scoop of ice cream as well! Sharing the Gospel with EvQ

You may be talking to your friend at the office water cooler about the weekend sport and the topic of non-binary sexuality comes up. How do you respond as a Christian? You may be someone in the public realm who leads a team or organisation that supports progressive ideas of diversity and inclusion. How do you speak to them about this? Currently in our second year, the EvQ School of Evangelism is supporting Christians across the spectrum of evangelistic gifts: from the 'everyday Christian' to the personal evangelist to the public speaker. Having lunches, conversations, getting to know people. One lady had Hindu beliefs. Being curious about her beliefs opened the opportunity to share my own faith. I shared the Gospel with her and normally that's where my evangelism stops. My EvQ mentor Mark really helped me to take the next step which has been a struggle for me. He gave me the nudge saying, 'Why not try this? Why not try that?', which, as an answer to prayer, now means I'm reading the Bible with her".

Reframing Perspectives

Reframe is a safe community for women to share perspectives, re-think positions and change practice, in order to grow in work and life. Currently, there are six Reframe small discussion groups. The majority are in Sydney, with one in Melbourne. Each small group meets 8-10 times across the year, generally monthly, at a time and location convenient to the group. It would be easy to start a Reframe group in other locations.

Participant, facilitator, and content contributor YiQin said, "Reflecting on my values, examining how I make decisions, facing the truth about my priorities – these are just some of the conversations we've had in Reframe this year. I love the program because it offers a safe, welcoming and open dialogue where mature Christians, new Christians and not yet Christians alike are all able to look afresh at their lives." Her non-Christian work colleague Rebecca* said, "I love Reframe discussions, because they help me reflect on questions I've not asked myself before."

YiQin has written a number of blogs and resources for Reframe. She knows where her hope comes from. She recently wrote, "I can safely say that trusting Jesus with my eternity has been the best decision I have ever made. Even though there are no less circumstances beyond my control, my hope is secure, and my life is full of purpose, meaning and peace. Even when results don't go my way, I can hold onto God's promise because I know he won't let me down."

I thank God for YiQin and the other eighteen faithful and committed Christian women who contribute to the groups. I thank God too for Rebecca and the other fifteen or so enquirers. It has been a joy to share our lives and build relationships. The hope is, that in time, these women find the life that is truly life as they engage with Jesus in the Bible. I'm currently reading the Bible with one enquirer I met through Reframe.

In February we held our annual *Life@Work Conference*, attended by over 700 Christians across Australia (with additional watch parties in New Zealand, Hong Kong, and even Washington DC!).
