Big Picture

Compassion for others is costly; we use our money for the good of others.



But a Samaritan, as he travelled, came where the man was; and when he saw him, he took pity on him. He went to him and bandaged his wounds, pouring on oil and wine. Then he put the man on his own donkey, brought him to an inn and took care of him. The next day he took out two denarii and gave them to the innkeeper. 'Look after him,' he said, 'and when I return, I will reimburse you for any extra expense you may have.'

Key Truths

- 1. Count the resources the Samaritan uses to care for the beaten man; bandages, oil and wine, his donkey, a room in an inn, two denarii, plus any extra costs. And that's before we consider any lost income for deviating from his business.
- 2. Compassion is costly, and the Samaritan is commended not because he has done something amazing, but because he has done what was expected of him in loving his neighbour.


