What matters in life – Sermon on the Mount - Session 6^{i 1}

Matthew 6:19-24 ¹⁹“Do not store up for yourselves treasures on earth, where moths and vermin destroy, and where thieves break in and steal. ²⁰ But store up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where moths and vermin do not destroy, and where thieves do not break in and steal.” ²¹ “For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also.” ²² “The eye is the lamp of the body. If your eyes are healthy, your whole body will be full of light. ²³ But if your eyes are unhealthy, your whole body will be full of darkness. If then the light within you is darkness, how great is that darkness!” ²⁴ “No one can serve two masters. Either you will hate the one and love the other, or you will be devoted to the one and despise the other. You cannot serve both God and money.”

Q1. What is something that is precious to you and why is it precious to you? (It could be a person, thing, experience or memory.)

It is important to God what we value or consider precious, and we will soon find out why.

Before we look at what Jesus has to say, let's look at where we are up to in Jesus' "Sermon on the Mount".

From previous weeks

In the past few weeks, we have discovered that what matters to God is where our heart lies.

The Pharisees, who were part of the religious leadership in Jesus' day, were extremely zealous in their devotion to God, keeping 613 laws.

Matthew 5:20 "For I tell you that unless your righteousness surpasses that of the Pharisees and the teachers of the law, you will certainly not enter the kingdom of heaven."

But what God is concerned about, is your heart. Jesus does not say that you need to keep 614 laws instead of 613 if you want to have a righteousness that's greater than the Pharisees. What he says is that following God, being his disciple, is a matter of the heart.

Jesus then gives examples of how God looks at the heart. For example, it's not about whether you murder someone, but about whether you are angry with someone. And it's not just about whether you love your neighbour – it's about whether you love your enemy.

Last week, we considered Jesus' teaching about doing things in secret where only God can see what we do, instead of doing things for the approval of other people. Secrecy safeguards sincerity – and God will reward you as he sees what is done in secret because he cares about where your heart truly lies.

Two treasures

Treasure: (from Dictionary.com)

- 1. wealth or riches stored or accumulated, especially in the form of precious metals, money, jewels, or plate;*
- 2. wealth, rich materials, or valuable things*
- 3. any thing or person greatly valued or highly prized*

Matthew 6:19-20 ¹⁹"Do not store up for yourselves treasures on earth, where moths and vermin destroy, and where thieves break in and steal. ²⁰ But store up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where moths and vermin do not destroy, and where thieves do not break in and steal."

Why does it matter?

Matthew 6:21 ²¹ "For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also."

Two visions

Matthew 6:22-23 ²² "The eye is the lamp of the body. If your eyes are healthy, your whole body will be full of light. ²³ But if your eyes are unhealthy, your whole body will be full of darkness. If then the light within you is darkness, how great is that darkness!"

Q7. What do you think Jesus is talking about here?

The eye is how we see things. When we see something we like, we want it and give our attention to it. If the thing we see is good for us, then it is healthy for us and impacts us in a positive way. But if the thing is not good for us, it will also impact our whole being as a person – but in a negative way.

We can have blind spots too, which means we are unable to see that we are actually being driven and controlled by the thing we are so focused on. And we fail to realize what it is costing us.

For example, you might see a corner office and think, “I really want that office” and put all your time and efforts into getting that corner office. You think about how to impress your boss. You spend extremely long hours at work. Your thoughts are consumed by how to fulfill all the key performance indicators. But when we are so focused on that corner office, we can fail to see that it is actually costing us our relationships with friends and family or our health.

Two masters

Matthew 6:24²⁴ “No one can serve two masters. Either you will hate the one and love the other, or you will be devoted to the one and despise the other. You cannot serve both God and money.”

A heart problem
